Care Corner - My Aging Pigs

Hello members. Hope all is well with you. It is a typical Texas spring. Rain, thunder, lightening, tornado warnings. Those that live outside of California know this weather pattern as well. We are learning to go with the flow. My pigs are also going with the flow. If it is raining, I hold an umbrella over them as they eat; that is unless lightening starts, then I go inside. I guess they do not care much where they are as long as they are fed!

Since my pigs are getting old, I thought I would cover this subject. Every year I think it is Bumper's last, and one day I will be writing his obituary. It will be a sad day for sure, but he is living a great life and there will be no regrets. Petunia is also getting on in years. I am not as attached to her, as Bumper was my first. Don't get me wrong, I love her to death, but Bumper is, and always will, be my favorite.

We all know eyesight in our pigs is poor. As they age, it gets worse. You would almost not even notice since they have such a great sense of smell and can get right over to us as if they had 20-20. I understand as they age, they could have constipation problems. Hmmmm, so do humans. If it gets severe, a pig may refuse to eat. We all understand now that when a pig stops eating, something is wrong. A teaspoon of low-fat oil put on their food a couple times a week may help this problem. There are other things you can buy for this purpose and I would guess your Vet would know what would be best to use. Of course, water is so very important as I have covered this many times. As they age, it becomes even more important that they drink plenty of it. I am not one to add anything to my pigs' water, but if it would make them drink even more, should there be a problem. I would add juice like apple or cranberry, or kool-aid. My pigs have access to plenty of water year-round, as I keep their pool full just in case they dump their water bowls. Mine seem to drink water in large amounts and I have not had any problem. I hope I never do. I do add water to their food. Something I started a few years ago for Bumper, so that he could eat his food easier. Not that I noticed that he had any trouble, but he always took a drink and then would take a bite and he did this through his entire meal. He still does this, but he does it less. Exercise is very important (just as it is for us as we age) and having a friend (two pigs) helps.

It helps for elimination to not just sit all day just as it would for us. It is harder for indoor pigs; not as much exercise happening there. Pigs really need a play yard (my opinion), fresh air, places to walk and time to just be a pig. I suppose a little dose of prunes would be of some help. Not many mind you; you know what would happen with too many!

My pigs, of course, are outdoor pigs and perhaps why Bumper is living a long life thus far. Indoor pigs can get a little bit of exercise (and you too) by walking around the house for 15-20 min. I would prefer to walk outside, but sometime weather can be an issue.

Pigs also can lose some teeth as they age. Keep an eye on their gums for signs of this. I hope I can learn more on this issue of aging and perhaps as I am aging, I can relate to my pigs in the way of health issues. We don't seem to be all that different. *Till next month*,

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Adopt-A-Thon - May 4, 5, & 6, 2007



The Riverside County Department of Animal Services Third Annual Adopt-A-Thon was held for three days, May 4, 5, & 6. Again, SCAMPP was privileged to be invited to have a Booth at this event. This is a great event where the Animal Services Department puts on a fun and educational community outreach to help raise funds and aid many "furry friends" in gaining a life-long loving home. I must say the coordinators of this event, as in the past, had things very wellplanned. They were so good to the vendors, supplied us with free food and refreshments every day, and made sure we had everything we needed for our booths, etc. There were animal demonstrations, lots of fun and games for the kids, a dunk tank, characters dressed up to entertain us, a "pooch smooch" booth, music, a variety of animal vendors, a canine massage booth, a pet wash, Jamba Juice!, as well as jewelry and home products booths. They even supplied the vendors with a free t-shirt and "thank you treat packets." I believe for this event, these three days, that the adoption fees were waived or lowered in order to encourage adoptions. In addition to the 166 pets placed in loving homes, another 40 prospective adopters placed holds on shelter animals that were not yet available for adoptions, so even though attendance to the booths was low, people were going in the front doors and visiting the shelter, which was good. In the past, they've had the booths set up in the front parking lot

where all attendees would see and visit the booths. They decided to give us more space this year and put the booths and entertainment in the back parking lot. It was nice to have the extra space, but I think not many visitors were aware of all the fun & informational stuff at

It was very difficult for me to get SCAMPP volunteers for this event. I realize everybody is busy, but these events are our opportunity to get information out to the public regarding proper health & care of potbellied pigs, pros & cons, support for uneducated or new potbellied pig owners, and a way of hopefully gaining new SCAMPP members. 

There was a time, not too long ago, when I thought I would die if anything ever happened to my beloved pet, Oscar. I knew his life was not eternal, but, for some reason, I did not believe my life could continue without my seven-year old, pot-belly pig. My mom gave him to me when I was only twelve years old as a reward for bringing home a straight "A" report card. He was ten pounds, had black, bristly hair and grunted with nearly each step he took. Oscar eventually grew up to be 115 pounds (a little larger than the "no more than forty pounds" promise made by the lady who sold him). Nevertheless, everyday I only loved him more. As there was no way I could leave him with my parents after graduating from high school, he sat in the back seat of my red, Honda Civic as I drove 350 miles to begin our college life in Davis. While I was sure I would die if anything ever happened to him, it only took one unfortunate day for me to discover what life would be like without Oscar.

It was the last morning of a long weekend and I woke up to eight small paws jumping on my stomach. This was a common occurrence, considering I have two, very hyper, terrier-mix dogs who both insist my stomach is a prime spot to play on at seven in the morning. I groaned and rolled over, doing my best to fend off my furry alarm clocks. As I turned, I realized they had brought me a pill bottle which they apparently had been playing with. The label was chewed off, the cap was missing, there were tiny teeth marks everywhere--and it was empty!

I ran downstairs and found much more than a pill bottle. My boyfriend, Ram, had left his backpack on the ground and every-

thing in it was scattered around the living room floor. Pens, pencils, notebooks and other assorted junk littered the carpet. It was not hard to discover the culprit behind this mess-Oscar's snout was in the bag when I entered the room. I asked Ram if there were any pills in the bottle that Oscar or the dogs could have eaten. He assured me the bottle was empty and there was no way any of them could have eaten anything.

Less than an hour later, I noticed my pig acting a bit peculiar and realized Ram must have been mistaken. Parts of Oscar's body would twitch like a fly had landed on him and his gait was a little off. It being the middle of winter, there were no flies around, and there was no reason for him to be walking the way he was. I called Ram to tell him and he responded that it was possible some of the pills could have fallen out of the bottle and been crushed at the bottom of his backpack, but he assured me there could have been no more than one or two pills in all.

I immediately took Oscar to the UC Davis Veterinary Medical Teaching Hospital (VMTH). The vet, Dr. Pires, decided it was best for my pig to stay there for the day to be monitored. Around 9:00 PM, Dr. Pires said Oscar was doing much better and it would be safe for him to come home. Once we were back at the house, I realized Oscar was not in as good of condition as Dr. Pires had hoped. He even refused his dinner, a sure sign a pig is very sick. That night, neither of us could sleep. He stood up every few minutes, walked a few steps and then fell back down. I knew he had to go back to the vet, but I thought I could wait until the morning

At 7:30 AM, thirty minutes before the vet hospital opened, I left Oscar in my bed to take a quick shower. When I returned to my room, Oscar had jumped off my bed and was now lying on the floor. It took me a few minutes to figure it out, but Oscar was no longer able to walk. Moreover, he was too heavy for me to carry by myself. My eyes swelled with tears as I called the VMTH explaining the situation. The receptionist on the other end of the line asked if anyone was there to help me. Choking with pain, I told her my roommate was home but was in the shower. She advised me to wait for her to help me and then come over to the hospital as fast as possible. So that Oscar could

be next to my car when my roommate was ready, I began dragging him out of my room, down the stairs and out the front door. I watched in horror as my strong, invincible pig did not have the strength to lift his own head. All he could do was produce a soft, moaning noise.

After my roommate was able to help me lift Oscar into the car and I had arrived at the VMTH, I called the receptionist back to tell her a vet tech needed to come help me. While waiting in the parking lot, Oscar's breathing became labored. His eyes were slowly closing and the quiet moaning became even softer. I knew I was losing him, but still could not bring myself to believe he was actually dying. This was my pig who had once been ten pounds and had once traveled 350 miles with me to move to a new city on our own. Whenever I was upset, he was the one who was always there for me and usually the only one I wanted to be with.

My screams were heard throughout the VMTH as the vet shook her head while placing a stethoscope on his chest. No one could possibly know how I felt. I hugged his liteless body and could not grasp the concept that he would never again ride in the car with me on the drive home to LA, never again root his way under the blankets in my bed and never again be there to greet me as I came home from a long day at school. My tear drops hit his body and caught in his bristly hair before disappéaring. I stayed with him for about thirty minutes before I pet Oscar for the last time, kissed his beautiful cheek and walked out of the hospital with a large part of me missing. For the first time in seven years, I was sad and there was nobody there to comfort me.

My pig, who was supposed to live forever, had died. It took me 19 years to discover first-hand that death can happen suddenly and unpredictably. It is not reserved for the elderly; it can happen to a two year old dog, a teenage sibling or a seven year old pig. However, I realize life could not be life if I were to dwell on death all day. Instead, I can think back to memories of Oscar and smile at the times he made me laugh, the times he let me cry on him and treasure the many nights I spent cuddling with him before falling asleep. I hope I made him as happy as he made me. ~Stacy

Sanctuary Report

A couple of months ago, I received a plea for help from a sanctuary that was on the verge of having to re-locate a number of pigs due to lack of funds and volunteer help at the sanctuary. The sanctuary has 70+ rescued potbellied pigs amongst other types of rescued animals. A couple of workers there have been putting every penny they could into the teed, vet care, and various needs for these animals. Money and resources had run out. I forwarded the plea to several SCAMPP members and animal lovers that I know. I sent a personal donation and the SCAMPP Board voted to send a donation from SCAMPP as well. Long story shortened, things have started to look up for this sanctuary and all of the pigs that were in danger of having to be moved, out-of-state, trom their sate and loving home where they had been rescued to and had been loved, some tor years, are being sponsored and will be able to stay, at least for the moment. The sanctuary is still in need, as most all sanctuaries are!!! SCAMPP supports a half dozen local rescues and sanctuaries on a quarterly basis, but this particular sanctuary was not on our list. THANK YOU to all who pulled together to help. Obviously we can not support them all; there are many

more sanctuaries and rescue persons that are in need (including some of our own <u>members</u>). It anyone can help, please contact us and we can direct you to those who need your help in order to keep and support the many potbellied pigs that have been rescued from abusive & neglectful situations, and those that have been abandoned or "dumped," not because of their own fault. For this reason, SCAMPP is totally in tavor of spaying and neutering. There is an overabundance of homeless, neglected, abused & abandoned potbellied pigs that need to be loved who need homes FIRST!!! If you know of anyone looking tor a potbellied pig, please refer them to us. As you can tell (in our Adoption Corner), there are many pigs that we can recommend, so many that we can not list them all. The worker at this sanctuary who contacted me wanted me to pass on a rather long message, but obviously I do not have room to post the entire message here. It anyone wants to read it, please contact me and I will forward it to you, but her main remark was:

YES, THERE ARE GUARDIAN ANGELS FOR PIGGIES; THEY ARE CALLED SPONSORS, DONORS AND VOLUNTEERS.

Help Needed

Now with that said, here's a need right in our own back yard. I received a e-mail from a lady who rescued (confiscated, you might say) a couple of pigs from a neighbor whom she witnessed beating the pigs with shovels. The poor pigs had been so neglected they couldn't even stand due to their hooves being so overgrown. She e-mailed me to ask if I knew anyone who could take these poor pigs. I explained the dilemma to her (homes are hard to find, etc., etc.) She explained that she is financially unable to pay for the permits required, basic needs (hoot trimming, vet costs) & even the cost of food that will add up. Fuest Speaker Report - June 9th Meeting



Meeting, we had, as our guest speakers, Ercell and Eva Ingram of Belly

Ercell & Eva Ingram

Draggers Ranch, a non-profit potbellied pig sanctuary, located in San Martin, CA. This was the first time I'd met them. I'd always heard nothing but GOOD about them, and now I can say that I feel the same way about them. They were both very friendly and pleasant to visit with. They came prepared with handouts entitled "A Typical Day At Belly Draggers Ranch - Seven Days a Week," which includes photos and lists their daily routine from sun -up to sun-down as they care for the nearly 30 pigs they have at their ranch.

They have rescued and cared for potbellied pigs since 1991, when they got their first pig, Nigel. Then a member of another sanctuary called and asked them to take in an

abandoned crippled pig, named Bodie, so they did. When word got out that they would take in pigs, the calls started coming in. Soon they also had Hamish, and Jazz, and the numbers grew; 10 became 20, 20 became 30, 30 became 40....soon they reached their limit as far as their acreage would allow. As their older pigs pass away, they have decided not to take in any more due to their ages (as you know, potbellied pigs can live up to 20 years) and they are really looking forward to retirement and being able to travel, etc. In all these years, this was the first time they have been able to come to a SCAMPP meeting, even though they have been on our newsletter mailing list and SCAMPP has been sending quarterly donations to them for a number of years. It sure was nice to put such pleasant faces and voices to these lovely people that I've only heard and read about for many years.

Atter sharing a bit about themselves and the history of how

Belly Draggers got started, we had a question and answer time with them. Since they are not professional trainers or vets, they felt they could only share "their own experiences" on questions asked by our members. Issues brought up pertained to aggression problems (aggression towards people as well as to other pigs), medical problems, housing ideas, zoning issues and steps to try to obtain "sanctuary" status. A few things that were particularly interesting to me were: ① aggression in pigs could be due to boredom, 2 after seven to eight years of age, the pigs really don't need their vaccinations anymore, but should still have the de-wormer, and 3 the kind of heaters used for sows is safe for outdoor pigs' housing (I am the type that covers up my pigs every night with many blankets, especially in cold weather, because they are outdoor pigs...).

I'm out of room here, but want to say THANKS again to Ercell & Eva for coming and sharing their time and knowledge with us and hope they can come back soon. ~ Peggy

Homer's Story

In April, I received a e-mail which was originally sent to a pig owner up North, and from there was forwarded to several other pig owners before finally being forwarded to me. This is how the story Homer began....

A young man, whose hobby is photography, was out taking photos of the scenery in the Carbon Canyon. He was on a public road when he saw this pig from a distance. Being a lover of animals, he went to get a closer look at the pig. The pig was in the owner's rather large yard which is surrounded by a wrought iron fence. As the young man got closer to the fenced-in area, the pig came running to him from across the field. The pig was excited to see a visitor and was very friendly. The young man went on to say that "it was sad because one of the pig's tusks was digging into it's face...." Since he had his camera, he took photos of the pig, along with his photos of the surrounding area. When he reported this to his mom, his mom started the chain of e-mails that were forwarded from Northern Calif. all the way down to Southern Calif. and ended up in my inbox. The mom was asking for help for this poor pig which seemed to be neglected as far as tusk care.

It just so happened that I had re-ceived, a few short weeks before this, a new SCAMPP membership from a lady who lives near the Carbon Canyon'. I had been corresponding with her for a few weeks and she had mentioned that she drives through the Canyon every day on her way to work. I knew from her conversations that she is a lover of potbellied pigs, and has a big heart for the many abused, neglected and abandoned homeless potbellied pigs. She had told me her dream is start her own sanctuary one day. This new member, is Rosalinde and she owns Little Wilbur - adopted from Priscilla Valentine (see photos on pages 5 & 6). Immediately, I e-mailed Rosalinde the photos and asked her if she recognized the area and if she might have a chance to stop and check out the pig. She gladly found the pig and took photos as well. She knew that the pig's tusks needed to be trimmed. She returned later with Andreas, her fiancé and knocked on the owner's

door. She introduced herself and explained that she noticed that the pig's tusks need to be trimmed. She told them that we have a mobile tusk trimmer who would be willing to come out and trim the tusks - with their permission. The owners accepted the offer and gave permission for Kelley Moon to come and trim "Homer."

So...Rosalinde, Kelley, and the owners, coordinated a date for the trimming. I met them there on that day to observe. Homer is approx. 8 to 10 yrs old, and had not been used to being handled for vet care or trimming. All of us worked to-gether (Kelley, Rosalinde, Andreas, and myself) and tried to corra Homer with the exercise pen, but it just was not working. There is a big hill in Homer's yard and once Homer ran up that hill, he was NOT going to come down. Finally the owners came out to help. The lady of the house went up the hill and began talking sweetly to Homer, trying to get him to come down the hill and get some water. It was hot that day and Homer was stressed-out and over-heated. We all stood back out of the way and when Homer finally came down, we surrounded him with the exercise pen, got him flipped, and Kelley began her work. She worked very quickly and soon his hooves & both tusks were trimmed. When Kelley was almost done, she told us that as soon as Homer is back up on his feet, we were all to applaud and praise him, and throw him treats, which we did. It was an exciting moment!! We could tell right away that Homer felt better and could eat better without those tusks digging into his face. We could tell that the owners care about Homer, they just were not wellinformed on the care & needs of potbellied pigs. I put together a packet of our SCAMPP newsletters & informational sheets for the owners. We gave the owners our contact info and told them they can call us anytime. Rosalinde still stops by to see Homer every week. She takes him treats and he comes running to her from across the field, very excited to see her. He really is a very sweet pig! ~ Peggy


