Editor's Note: I received a call on Feb. 21st from our member Lynn Vollmer informing me that her precious piggy, Wee Willie - 13 years old, had passed away. Lynn and her husband, Brent, were very active members of SCAMPP and always brought Wee Willie to our events and pig shows until around a year or so ago, they moved to Idaho. They were concerned that to move Willie at his age would not be a good idea, plus the fact that Willie was not acclimated to living in the snow. Therefore they left Willie boarded with some very good and caring friends at the stable where they had boarded their horses. The caring mends at the stable where they had boarded their horses. The people had known Willie for some time and took great care of him. It was a sad day when Lynn called me to report the passing of Willie. Lynn wrote a very nice note to SCAMPP which said: "...Thanks for keeping in teach (which was will.) scampe which said: ... Thanks for keeping in touch (which we will still do) and the many years of piggy-fun. Without SCAMPP and the member support, having Willie wouldn't have been as much funsincerely, Lynn" The following is Lynn's tribute to Willie. ~ Peggy

When I first met Willie, I had been looking for a pet pig for about 5 years & I just hadn't found the right one. Then I visited a friend who had a potbellied pig she was using for her petting zoo. He was being kept in a bucket with some hay. I looked in - picked the little guy up (he weighed only one pound) and didn't put him down until I got home. She told me he was six months old, but it turned out he was three weeks old.

When Willie came home, he had to meet the whole family (two dogs, one cat, two llamas, & five horses). Brent & I always took all the animals for walks

around our house - usually miles at a time, and hike in the hills too. If Willie was going to live with us, he would have to hike too, which he did up until the last year of his

From the beginning, he took to riding in the car and traveled very well. Because he walked on a leash and would follow me offleash so well, he got to go many places. We took him to SCAMPP Pig Shows. We took him on vacations with us to the Kern River where he'd go in the river and root around. We took him to parks for walks, to pet parades, fundraisers, the snow, out to lunch, walks in the mountains, costume classes at Petsmart and PetCo. He'd even go for carriage rides when we had our driving horses. Willie was a "go-for-it" kind of guy, if I thought of it-he'd try it.

People couldn't believe how anyone could love a pig - I can't

understand how anyone can't love them. ~ Lynn

dies for a job well done. Swiftly approaching is the Pet Expo, April 17th, 18th, 19th at the Orange County Fairgrounds. This is a major event for SCAMPP and the excitement is definitely brewing for all those involved. It looks as though Jo Davis has once again put the wheels in motion for a great and well organized outing for SCAMPP members to get our message out of education, adoption and care for our beloved potbellied pigs. I just want to say "thanks as well" to all of you volunteering to help out with the staffing schedule for this event; some of you are coming great distances or at great personal expense to help support this event and please know it is greatly appreciated. We will have pigs present this year at both booths which is very helpful in drawing people to our booths and will heighten awareness towards our causes. This will be one of the biggest public exposures

for SCAMPP this year and I truly believe it will be our best year ever at the Pet Expo.

A topic that was present at the meeting and discussion was regarding rescues and SCAMPP's position about possibly providing an interview to the Riverside Press. As stated in our mission statement on our website: "this corporation shall be to provide advocacy, action, and necessary support towards attaining the best quality of life for pigs as pets; to supply education about the pig and pigs as pets to current pig owners, prospective pig owners, the general public, civic partners, and community partners; to give back to the needs of the community through services provided by SCAMPP and collaborations with SCAMPP, with the interest of the breed incorporated into these endeavors." In keeping with this mission statement, an interview was granted by myself to Miss Lorrie Lucas of the Riverside Press with input from those in attendance at the meeting and other board members. Our website was used as a central catalyst of reference for the questions she asked regarding the current plight of potbellied pigs in southern California and focused on informing the public to their needs.

The economic times facing all of us are dramatic to say the least, but utterly as important it was explained to Miss Lucas that the care, well being, needs and future homes of pigs are as well in serious danger. An epidemic is sweeping upon us regarding potbellied pigs for the once loved and cared for pig family members who are now finding even themselves displaced be-

cause of foreclosures, job loses and the financial economic climate down turns. Miss Lucas referred to SCAMPP as a rescue organization initially but was swiftly corrected. She was re-educated during the interview that SCAMPP diligently supports the efforts of rescue organizations and members individually who have taken it upon' themselves to help in rescues, providing food, safe transport, housing and medical care for the growing number of pigs who have been abandoned by their owners, but in essence SCAMPP is not a rescue organization unto itself. It was also explained that SCAMPP has provided, through its website, a means by which people can donate to specific groups who are conducting rescues in certain areas of Southern California and provides structured controls for funds needing to be disbursed to the appropriate groups. The focus point throughout the interview was providing current pig information to perhaps a misinformed society, education to an unaware public and encouragement of much needed financial support for potbellied pigs from the public through a widely read newspaper with regards to abandoned and/or neglected pigs. Hardships will face pot-

Hardships will face potbellied pigs in the immediate future unfortunately, but through the membership's support of events that educate and inform the public, the diligent efforts of all those who make it their daily goal to try and rescue as many pigs as they are able to possibly touch and through our commitment to speak up and out for our beloved potbellied pigs, hope will remain constant for pigs everywhere.

IMPORTANT INFO

For those of you who have already volunteered to help at a SCAMPP Booth, here are a few important things you need to know. If you need additional info, please call Jo Davis at 951-591-2184 or e-mail pigs4life@aol.com ASAP.

1. Jo needs to know ASAP how many attending and your addresses for badges.

2. Jo needs to know ASAP how many are actually coming BEFORE OPENING (8am) to unload pigs and set-up, so she can send "move-in passes" along with the badges.

3. Those that are coming early will not be let in the gate if they forget their badge or move-in pass, you will have to wait until the Expo opens at 10 a.m. They want the move-in pass on the dashboard and your badge in sight...so they can just glance at each car. After you unload, you must remove your vehicle from the grounds by 9 a.m. or they can tow your vehicle.

If you use an Exhibitor parking pass, you also need to be there EARLY as the lot fills up fast, first come, first served.

5. If you come later in the day, there are no exceptions to driving onto the Exhibitor parking area if it is full, you will have to walk you pigs into the exhibit area. If the free parking is also full, they will not let you in at all.

6. The Expo does not want any animals being walked into an exhibit area that they are not assigned; they have had problems in the past. Also, the Fairground area that houses the hogs, chickens, geese, vegetable garden etc. is not part of the Expo and they do not want exhibitors to walk their animals in that area during the Expo.

 If you are told your badges are at "Will Call", the Will Call booth is inside the camping area by Gate 4.



DRIVING DIRECTIONS

FROM LOS ANGELES:

405 Freeway south, exit at Fairview Road, turn right on Fairview, left on Fair Drive or the 5 Freeway south to the 55 Freeway south and exit at Del Mar/Fair Drive, turn right on Fair Drive.

FROM PASADENA/SAN GABRIEL VALLEY

Proceed to the 57 Freeway South (using the 210, 10 or 60 Freeways) to the 5 Freeway south to the 55 Freeway south and exit at Del Mar/Fair Drive, turn right on Fair Drive.

FROM LAX/LONG BEACH:

405 Freeway south, exit at Fairview Road, turn right on Fairview, left on Fair Drive.

FROM RIVERSIDE:

91 Freeway west to 55 Freeway south, exit Del Mar/Fair Drive, turn right on Fair Drive.

FROM SAN DIEGO:

5 Freeway north to 55 Freeway south, exit Del Mar/Fair Drive, turn right on Fair Drive.

We will have two SCAMPP Booths; one booth on the grass in the large animal section near the llamas and miniature donkeys, and another booth in front of the Adoption Building. Our booth numbers are #260 and #512. Our main booth will be near the Green Gate (Gate 3), so if you are just coming to visit, enter Gate 3 off Fairview Drive. If you are working a booth and have an Exhibitor Parking Pass, enter at Gate 4 off Arlington.

give this wonderful piggy a new life.


I got an email from Marion the day after

It's been just one year since I lost Bumper and I am missing him. I know some of you have lost your pets as well, so you know how I am feeling.


Well, I hope you have the pools all filled for your piggy's. Warm weather makes them want to get their little feet wet! I've filled Petunia's pool.

Crystal and Napoleon

Maggie and Peyton, rescued potbellied pigs, are now safely in Mack, Colorado, along with a tiny surprise guest – a piglet named Napoleon. "He's our hitchhiker," says Yvonne McIntosh, manager of Best Friends' Piggy Paradise, where potbellies live on the sanctuary grounds. Napoleon, three weeks old and weighing just three pounds, was included in McIntosh's recent trek to <u>Pig-A-Sus Homestead Sanctuary</u>, which agreed to take all three.

"Maggie and Peyton slept the whole trip from Las Vegas up to Best Friends' sanctuary," says Crystal KimHan, who rescued Maggie and Peyton through Vegas Pig Pets, her home-based organization.

To continue the longer leg of the trip to Colorado with two adult pigs, KimHan needed a trailer. So McIntosh arranged it, did the driving herself, and supplied a truck and trailer with crates the pigs could walk in and out of. There was also lots of cushy straw in their crates and all around the trailer, and blanket covering the crates to shield them from the wind – all to make the ride as comfortable as possible for Maggie and Peyton. KimHan underwrote the cost of the trip.

Napoleon rode up-front with McIntosh and KimHan. "He's still being hand-fed formula," Kim-Han says. "He's very cute." Having Napoleon along was one of those last-minute requests that KimHan couldn't have predicted. When she was asked a day before she was to leave for Best Friends to take in a newborn piglet whose five siblings had been crushed by their mother and father, she called Sioux Robbins, who runs Pig-A-Sus. "She said, 'Bring him too,'" KimHan says.

As for three-year-old Maggie, she found herself homeless when her previous people's house went into foreclosure. And Peyton, who is about seven, was rescued from a dog-fighting ring, where she was used as bait. "Her injuries – a partially caved-in head and a bitten-off ear – weren't caused by humans," says KimHan.

But those bleak days are behind all three. Now, they're safely ensconced at Robbins' pig sanctuary, where the focus is care, health and education of potbellied pigs. Helping the pigs get to a safe environment is a part of Best Friends' mission of "No More Homeless Pets" – regardless of species. "It was in our neighborhood, so to speak," McIntosh says. "We're located between Nevada and Colorado. We help the pig community whenever we can." ~ Written by Cathy Scott, Photo by Molly Wald

This Post-Op Care Sheet was written by one of our members, Rosalinde, in response to Carnita's Spay Surgery Article in SCAMPP's Jan '09 issue (page 8) to help "prepare" other piggy parents when it is time to neuter/spay or having any type of surgery.

"POST OP" Care Sheet

After-Care Instructions for Potbellied pigs!

It is highly recommended to have these items already on hand before your piggy goes in for surgery:

- * "Rimadyl" -Pain Medication/Anti-inflammatory-by prescription only! These pills are liver flavored, ask your Vet to prescribe this medication instead of "Met Cam"! Much gentler on your piggy's stomach!!! (Ours vomitted TWICE after taking the Met Cam, we stopped giving it to her completely and the vomitting stopped) Ask your Vet for the recommended dose for your pig!
- * <u>"Stool softner"</u> There are several different brands to choose from! You want to get the one that has <u>ONE</u> active ingredient only and that is "Docusate Sodium" (costs about \$5) Your piggy <u>may</u> be constipated after surgery! So it's a good idea to have it already on hand! Especially if your piggy was spayed or neutered, it will be very painful to pass stool without the help of a stool softner! This ingredient will help "soften" the stool for easier "elimination"
- * <u>Cans of pumpkin</u> Great source of fiber!!! Helps with the constipation that follows after surgery! Combining this with a stool softner will keep your piggy regular!
- * <u>Electrolyte Fluids</u> (At ROOM temperature)-"Propell", Vitawater", "Pedialyte" are just a few of the many brands that offer electrolytes containing low amounts of sugar! Electrolytes are very important to help keep your piggy from dehydration that follows after surgery! It is very important that your piggy drinks LOTS of fluids during recovery to help "flush" out the Anesthesia, which in turn helps eliminate the nausea. The faster it flushes out, the better your piggy will feel:)
- * <u>Light Foods</u> For the first three-four days, it is recommended to <u>NOT</u> feed your piggy the usual dry pig chow! The piggy's throat will be VERY sore from the tube (when intubated during surgery) and the chow will be much too grainy and dry for the pig to swallow! It is recommended to feed the piggy several "small" servings of Oatmeal mixed with the pumkin throughout the day!
- * Blanket or Coat It is VERY important to keep your piggy warm and away from draft and cold temperature after surgery/ during recovery!!! The first two days are MOST critical after your piggy has been under Anesthesia! The #1 concern is "Hypothermia" (a reduction in body temperature)...your piggy may shiver when he/she first wakes up after the Anesthesia (usually in the recovery room at the Vetinary Hospital), it is very important for your piggy to be and stay warm. A blankie will do the trick:) Be sure to keep the blanket on her/him on the ride home as well. You may notice your piggy still shaking or shivering but that is usually a side effect from the pain killer that is injected during surgery...sometimes a second dose MAY be administered when the piggy is released from the Veterinary Hospital to keep he/she more calm for the long ride home. Which unfortunately will/may increase the nausea and shakiness. So be sure to ask your Vet if a second dose was or will be given at the time of release so at least you are aware that this will be normal! Once home, it will be hard to keep a blanket on your piggy throughout the night. It is recommended to make a "piggy coat", one that can be secured with velcro! All you would need is some Fleece material (the no-sew fabric that won't unravel) and some velcro that you can find at any Craft Store! And JOILA, you created a piggy coat:)
- Non-slip Rubber bottom or Foam Floor Mat/Roll This will come in VERY handy when your piggy first walks the ground into the Vet's Office. The slippery floors usually scare the piggies almost immediately. Not only will such a floor mat keep the piggy from slipping and sliding all over the floor but one will also be great to use for he/she to lay on when recovering after surgery (instead of bare concrete flooring)! Not only will it keep her/him warm but it will also prevent the piggy from slipping/falling when trying to stand up while still being drowsy!!! A Yoga mat or those "foam puzzles" are another great idea, too. Both are made of thick foam! Retail Stores like Walmart and Target usually carry these in stock:) It is also recommended to use a non slip cushion for the bottom of the crate for the drive to/from the Vet to keep your piggy from sliding side to side when driving curvy roads!
- * <u>Lastly</u>- Keep the incision clean and dry! Limit your piggy's activity, especially keep it from jumping and walking up steps for the first few days! Contact your Vet if you notice severe swelling, redness or excessive discharge coming from the incision!



While it's not a pleasant dinning room conversation, constipation is a common problem in pot-belly pigs. Chances are, at least a few times in your piggy's life, he will become constipated. In this article, I will go over how to identify if your pig is constipated, causes for it and ways to treat and prevent it.

How to know:

While you may think it is easy to notice if your pig is constipated, there may be some subtle signs you could miss.

- Not passing feces: The first and most obvious sign of constipation is if your pig is not passing any feces for several days or weeks at a time. Check your pig's favorite places to potty and make sure you find lots of "pig berries."
- Straining when trying to defecate: If you notice your pig trying to defecate and nothing is coming out or only a few small fecal balls are being passed, you should be worried.

Passing small, hard balls of feces: If the poop is hard and crumbly, your pig may not be regular. To test this, step on it and check if it smushes (as it should) or crumbles easily (as it shouldn't).

Causes:

There are more causes than I could ever list for constipation, but I will do my best to list all the ones I can think of. These should be diagnosed properly by your vet, but here are some for you to think about. These causes could either be chronic (lasting a long period of time) or acute (lasting a short time, one or a couple of days). Some of these causes overlap.

- **Blockage:** This could be due to a foreign object or food. Never let your pig eat corn on the cob or other large indigestible products, but if it happens to occur, your pig could be blocked. An x-ray can diagnose a blockage and surgery is almost inevitable.
- **Ulcers:** Pigs can develop ulcers in the esophagus, stomach, small intestines, colon, etc. These cause irritation and make it painful for pigs to eat, therefore causing constipation. Some pigs are more prone to ulcers than others. They can just simply develop on their own or be brought about by stress.
- **Stress:** As stated above, stress can cause ulcers, but it can also just make the pig not want to eat. If your pig is particularly timid or in a stressful environment, he may not want to eat and therefore become constipated.
- **Tumors:** Tumors are most common in the intestines or uterus of unspayed females, but can develop in other areas. They literally block food from being passed due to their mass. Surgery is a must to save your pig's life.
- Antibiotics: If your pig is on antibiotics for another reason, it can cause him to become constipated.
- Another illness: Other illnesses can cause your pigs to not feel well and therefore become constipated. Therefore, constipation could be a sign of another disease.

Lack of exercise: As you know, pot-bellies are from Vietnam and are used to warm, humid climates. When cold, they are more likely to stay in bed all day and not walk around like they normally do. This causes their tummies to move a little slower and increases the chance of constipation. Also, if your pig is overweight or older, he may move around less than he should which can cause him to become constipated.

Cures and Preventatives:

If your pig is constipated, all hope is not lost. To be safe, you should take your pig to your veterinarian to diagnose the reason, but if that is not an option or you wish to try something yourself first, here are a few suggestions.

- **Pumpkin**: Purchase a can of pure pumpkin puree (no additives). Add a couple of spoonfuls to your pig's normal meal. If your pig is prone to constipation, give him the pumpkin puree daily.
- Olive oil: Add approximately one tablespoon to your pig's bowl of food. This help "lube" up the digestive tract to help move things along. Again, this can be given daily, if your pig is prone to getting constipated, but should not be given to healthy pigs as it is high in fat.
- **Prunes:** Just like recommended for people, prunes help pigs become more regular. Be careful the prunes are not getting stuck in your pig's teeth. If they are, blend them up before feeding.
- Feed 2 or 3 times a day instead of once: Continue feeding the same amount of total feed, just split it up into 2 or 3 meals a day. I suggest this anyway, but especially if you are trying to prevent constipation. This will help increase metabolism and increase the passage of feces.
- Walking: Make sure your pig is walking around. If you are having trouble getting your piggy moving, spread some <u>plain</u> popcorn around and let piggy search for each kernel. A fun way for your pig to exercise. Enemas: The most invasive suggestion is to administer an enema for your constipated piggy. It should be given by a veterinarian or by experienced owners only. It is possible to injure your pig's rectum if done improperly which will cause a much bigger problem. They should only be given if a blockage is ruled out.

Disaster Preparation Cont. ~ by Laura

As a follow-up to the article in December's issue, "Practical Tips for Dealing with your Potbelly in a Time of Disaster", I'd like to add some additional information that I gathered from the San Bernardino County Animal Services website and from the Animal Defense League.

Motel 6?

Some disaster shelters are not allowed to accept pets because of health and safety regulations and other considerations. It could be difficult to find shelter for your animals in the middle of a disaster, so

plan ahead. Do not wait until disaster strikes to do your research.

Contact hotels and motels outside of your immediate area to find out about their policies on accepting pets and restrictions on number, size, and species. Ask if "no pet" policies could be waived during an emergency. Keep a list of "pet friendly" places, including phone numbers, with other disaster information and

Ask friends, relatives, or others outside the affected area whether they could shelter your animals. If you have more than one pet, they may be more comfortable if kept together, but be prepared to house

them separately.

Prepare a list of boarding facilities and veterinarians who could shelter animals in an emergency; include

24-hour phone numbers.

Take a look at the SCAMPP contact list and see which members are available to assist in transport and/

or board your pig(s) if necessary.

You should not rely on animal shelters to provide emergency shelter for your pets during a disaster because the majority of shelters are already over-burdened caring for the animals they already have as well as those that are displaced by disasters. The animal shelters should be your last resort.

A Pet Disaster Supply Kit

Whether you are away from home for a day or a week, you will need essential supplies. Keep items in an accessible place and store them in sturdy containers that can be easily carried. Your pet disaster supply kit should include:

Medications and medical records (stored in a waterproof container) and a first aid kit specific to the animals you own.

Leashes, harnesses, and/or carriers to transport pets safely to ensure that your animals cannot Current photos of your pets in case they get lost. Make sure you know the numbers of local animal shelters in case you do lose your pet. There is a good chance it may be turned in.

Food, portable water, bowls, pet beds, blankets and toys.

Information on feeding schedules, medical conditions, behavior problems, and the name and number of your veterinarian in case you have to foster or board your pets.

Pet waste bags

MOST IMPORTANT - The SCAMPP contact list!! This list identifies members that may be able to assist with transport or boarding.

Be Proactive!

Since warning signs are typically issued hours, and sometimes days in advance, be proactive to protect your pets at the first sign of a disaster.

Call ahead to confirm emergency shelter arrangements for you and your pets. Check to be sure your pet disaster supplies are ready to take at a moment's notice.

Bring all pets into the house so that you won't have to search for them if you have to leave in a

Make sure all of your pets, pigs included, are wearing collars/harnesses and securely fastened,

up-to-date identification.

Attach the phone number and address of your temporary shelter, if you know it, or a friend or relative outside the disaster area in case you become separated from your pet. You can buy temporary tags or put adhesive tape on the back of your pet's ID tag.

Planning and preparation will enable you to evacuate with your pets quickly and safely.

Lastly, if you must evacuate your home, do not leave your animals behind. Take them to a prearranged safe location if they cannot stay with you during the evacuation period. Since there is a possibility that a disaster may strike while you are away from home, consider placing a "Pet Alert" sticker on a front-facing window to alert emergency workers' to the presence of animals in your home. I just recently purchased one of these from the SCAMPP booth at one of our events that includes POTBELLY PIGS! You could also take it a step further and speak with your neighbors about setting up a plan to help one another in someone's absence.





Shelter List

Laura would like to start a list for members to "adopt" an animal shelter near them. By adopting a shelter, the member will be responsible for educating the shelter employees on proper care and feeding of PBPs, and they will also serve as a contact person for the shelter to call in case they get a potbellied pig in, but they will also periodically check to be sure a pig isn't there, but someone forgot to call our SCAMPP contact. Where does my money go?

As treasurer the most common question I get asked is: "Where does my membership money go?" The second question is: "Why did my dues go up?" So I thought I would write this for everyone so you can see for yourselves and at the same time explain why there was an increase this year. To keep this simple I have converted the numbers to each membership, first as newsletter only, second to full membership.


The largest portion of your dollars goes to the newsletter. This year with the slightly smaller version going out we will spend about \$14 or 40% of full membership and 56% of newsletter only. Each member also pays \$1 for the website fees, postage fees, P.O. Box fees and educational materials for a total of \$4. By the way, the website is maintained for free by Peggy, which saves our organization several hundred dollars a year (thank you, Peggy). The remaining \$7 goes to Administration costs (about \$5) and office supplies (about \$2).

Full membership pays all of the above fees plus \$10 for our quarterly associations. These are sanctuaries located throughout Southern California. This money is used to help buy food and medical care for abused or abandoned pigs. A worthwhile cause indeed!

As you can see from these numbers we lost money on each and every membership. Last year we actually paid MORE per newsletter and threw in the Christmas Party. Because of this loss, a lot of the money donated and raised went to get us back in balance.

This year by dedicating all of your money for these expenses, SCAMPP has been able to take 100% of our donations and fund raising and contribute directly to the needs of pigs. Through the month of March we have paid out more than \$1000 to help cover the costs of spay/neuter of recently rescued pigs. I'm proud of that number as last year we spent about \$600 for the entire year. This is an amortized increase of more than 650%! All of this came about because of a \$10 increase in full membership.





DID YOU KNOW?

From The Mystery Pig
