
The magnificent tribute to Bill in our newsletter (last month). Thank you Peggy and all who helped. That was so thoughtful. I will cherish it for the rest of my life.



Speedy's Speedy Adoption ~by Marlies of pigharmony.com



I received an owner-surrender E-Mail the first week of June, 2011. It was from the husband/ex-husband of someone that just bought a piglet from a breeder in Murrieta/Menifee about a month prior. They paid \$40 for her and she was not spayed (surprise!). The couple is going through a divorce and the wife moved into an apartment. She could not keep the piglet at the apartment and while the soon-to-be ex-husband said he had enough space for SPEEDY, it was just too much for him to care for with two kids that had busy schedules and two dogs that were too rough with her. SPEEDY had to be kept in a 6x6 dog kennel during the day and she was not getting enough attention.

Because this piggy was in crises and young enough that I knew I could place her relatively easily (and I had some good adoption leads I was working with), I agreed to take her in. It also coincided with the time frame that we were taking HOWDY to his home in Lemon Grove and on the way back, we agreed to pick up SPEEDY just off the 15 freeway in Temecula.

I explained to them about the irresponsibility of these breeders selling intact pigs to completely uneducated homes. SPEEDY's owner told me that the breeder refused to take her back because he was having a hard enough time getting rid of the litters he has (good job to all you Craigslist flaggers – you know who you are!!!). I told him what it costs for me to have a female spayed and while I knew they would not and could not pay an entire spay bill for a pig they were getting rid of, I asked them to please contribute whatever they could afford and I would recoup the rest from who ever adopted her. They gave me \$100. The spay bill was \$275. I wormed her myself.

I had been working with a family that hoped to adopt HOWDY, but because this would be their first pig, they were a little intimidated by his over-all stature. They had been to my house on three different occasions to meet piggies and to become better educated at what it takes to be a pig parent. I told them if any pig did not feel just quite right, to please remain patient and when the right one came along, I would know it. SPEEDY was the one! I made her appointment to be spayed the week after I took her in. I wanted her to have some time to recuperate from the surgery and as soon as she was ready, I'd take her to them.

That week of waiting for them was like the week before Christmas for an eager child. They were giddy and excited. They had already had a new name picked out for her, and while I tried to call her what they were going to name her, which was GRACIE, I just could not do it because I have a GRACIE of my own. During the second week I had her, I did teach her SIT and CIRCLE. But that was all I had time for. She is such a smart, well-behaved little girl. The entire 2 weeks I had her, she never had one accident in the house and she was only about 3-4 months old. \sim continued on next page

PigHarmo<mark>ny received E-</mark>mails, as often we do when pigs are located in local shelters, that yet another stray had been picked up in the Hemet area and brought into the Riverside shelter.

Over the course of the past several months, Trina Fehlman has introduced me to her friend, Donna, who volunteers at the Riverside shelter. Donna E-mailed me about this newest acquisition to the shelter and apparently all the staff raved about what a sweet guy he was and certainly worthy of consideration to try to save. Because I get reluctant at times (trial and error) of having non-pig people assess pigs for me before I agree to bring them in, I was reaching out to everyone and anyone that was more centrally located to the shelter to give me their true assessment of him. Because he was not only quite large at about 175 pounds, he had good size tusks and needless to say, he was an intact boar, I really had to be careful about bringing this guy in because, as well all know, most people just want to adopt babies. HOWDY had to be close to 5 years old at least. With the help of Peggy, Debbie, Andrew, Donna, Regina and many others, including dog/cat/bird rescue people, everyone banded together to help this gentle giant to a safe journey. Andrew and Peggy made arrangements through SCAMPP's 501(c) (3) status to get the shelter to release him to rescue and to waive all his impound fees.

Regina Horton kindly picked him up on his day of release the first week of May 2011 and transported him directly to Dr. Greek. Thanks to a number of generous supporters, we managed to pull together enough funds to pay for HOWDY's neuter and tusk trimming. After surgery, Andrew stepped up to the plate and offered to hold HOWDY for a few days at Kito's Krib until I could return from being out of town for a couple days so he could ultimately make it to PigHarmony. Andrew delivered him to me on May 18th. I had a few good adoption leads on the horizon and everyone that met HOWDY, fell in love with him. He's such a polite gentleman of a pig. He had the most awesome coat of hair, nobody could resist running their fingers through his luxurious pompadour.

After having started the adoption/screening process, Corinne and Brent drove the three-hour trek from Lemon Grove to PigHarmony just to meet him (along with other piggies I have waiting for adoption). They stayed about 1.5 hours and then made the drive back home. They sent me an E-mail later letting me know that they were in love and wanted to move forward. Just a few days before his transport to his new home, we very much felt a bath was in order. This boy has traveled the miles from being a stray in Hemet, onto the Riverside shelter, over to Yorba Linda for neutering, then to Garden Grove for just a few days, up to Acton and finally home to Lemon Grove.

His new mama is teaching him how to *oink* in French, fluently. This is just one example of an E-mail I received from his new mama since being placed:

Good Morning Marlies,

Today is the beginning of our 2nd week with Mr Howdy. This 1st week has been a delight. He is such a nice boy looking for cuddles (and food!) all the time. He has his routine set up and seems to enjoy it. He now climbs the stair leading to our kitchen back door. As he is a gentleman he "oinks" at the door to let us know he is here ... and wants some pop corn! LOL. The dog is now acquainted with him and they cope quite well together. I am just very careful when I give a treat to Howdy that AnnyBelle does not try to get it. For sure anyway he is not food aggressive. Just does not want a morning cuddle before his breakfast. Nothing else to say, which is good as it means everything's ok :-) Thanks again to have trusted us enough to give us this big piggy teddy bear! Have a great week-end. ~ Corinne



Dolly Madison & Georgie Boy The 3rd Time Is A Charm "by Marlies of PipHarmony cont

Dolly and Georgie hold a very special place in my heart. Dolly was one of the best pigs I have ever taken in since I've been involved in rescue. I have to admit that although we've had a lot of successful, fabulous adoptions – things happen in life that there are not always guaranteed no matter how much we do our best to screen, assess, educate, etc.

This one is really broke my heart. I was very close to bringing these two to come stay with us at PigHarmony because I could not stand the thought of them bouncing around one more time and them not understanding why. These piggies most certainly were victims of circumstance. This original failed adoption was just about enough to have me teetering on the edge of getting out of rescue completely, once and for all. I really felt I'd let these babies down.

It began in December 2009, when a SCAMPP member came to me out of desperation needing to find a home for Dolly. She and her husband had done all they could to do right by the very expensive piggy they purchased from a Texas breeder.

As many of us in rescue tend to react when someone says they need to give up their pig, these poor folks were met with a lot of criticism and negativity for not doing their homework and for purchasing from a breeder. It's nothing most of us have not already heard or said and the fact of the matter is most people that do wind up doing rescue, did purchase their first pig from a breeder. That aside, they tried to do all the right things from reaching out to other pig owners, seeking help from an unknowledgeable veterinarian, etc., but the fact of the matter is a pig is often not the perfect pet for every household. No breeder would ever tell that to an interested party ready to purchase though.

The couple that needed to re-home Dolly went above and beyond what most people would have done. They learned the hard way and ended up having some bad experiences. I wish most people that give up their pigs would be half as responsible as these people were.

This piggy was very, very highly adoptable. She was affectionate, sweet, and people-oriented. I didn't have much space at the time, but they agreed to donate all her fencing, her house and everything they bought for her, to me if I could make room for her and I did have adoptions on the horizon and I had an interested party that I thought might be perfect for Dolly. This "perfect applicant" answered the application just right, they lived very close to me and they wanted a second pig as a companion for their very shy little boy pig. The problem was that their pig was not neutered. The woman was new to country life, but her heart seemed to be in the right place. She talked a good talk at the beginning – let's just put it that way. I told her I could not consider adopting Dolly to her until Georgie (his name was Jorge) was neutered. She did follow through with that, so she showed good faith and responsibility in my opinion. I did the home visit, we talked and chatted some more, and about 2-3 weeks after I took Dolly in, we agreed to let this couple have her as a buddy for Georgie. Georgie was one of the most terrified pigs I had ever come across. Dolly was good for him. They told me they bonded quickly and Dolly was even showing Georgie how to trust humans.

For the next year, I had tried to make contact on numerous occasions so that I could visit the pair and see how they were getting along. The calls and E-mails went unanswered. I started to feel uneasy and finally sent a concerned E-mail which was met with a very nasty, negative E-mail back to me. I backed off and hoped for the best. About a year went by and I sent another "hello, how are you doing..." E-mail and things seemed to improve. She was suddenly cordial again. I was actually starting to become friends with the person that adopted and she would come to my house for girl-talk time or visiting with the animals. However, when I tried to get around to wanting to visit the pigs again, I was met with avoidance.

A few weeks after that, I started getting E-mails about the problems she was having with her fiancé and how things were not working out. After they adopted the pigs from me, about 6 months later, they adopted some goats from Animal Acres. They had great property, but they were ignorant. She finally E-mailed me one day that as she left for work, she saw coyotes stalking their property. When she got home, 3 of their 5 goats were dead.

Their relationship was becoming more and more strained and she finally admitted to me that she had to get rid of all their animals because she was selling her house. I told her I would like to take updated pictures of the pigs and get them some exposure and we will start trying to re-home them or worse come to worst, they could come stay with me. Again, she started to avoid me because her problems were more important than the animals' needs and that did not sit well with me. Her problems were unimportant to me at this point and I was focused on getting those poor pigs out of there. She cut off all communication with me. I tried to be nice but I was becoming very frustrated. I was sick to my stomach every day and I cried night after night frustrated and angry because I wanted to get these pigs to safety. My hands were tied.

I knew this woman had made friends with the then Ranch Manager of Animal Acres, so I asked him if he could help me get the pigs away from them. He and his friend worked their magic and low and behold, he showed up at my house with the two of them in crates. Both in dire need of a hoof trim, the male in need of a tusk trim, they both needed worming (Thank you Andrew and Kelley. Andrew made the first attempt to trim hooves and tusks, but they were in bad shape and needed follow up — which Kelley graciously handled). It was very apparent they were not fed a proper diet either. Because I had no vacancies at the time, Animal Acres agreed to hold them for awhile so they would be well-cared for and safe. On the first day of their arrival, the Ranch Manager asked me if Dolly had always only had one ear. My heart sank. I became filled with rage and wanted more than anything to seek justice for these poor, pitiful, helpless pigs. It's a good thing I have a conscience and I know two wrongs do not make a right. Besides that, I am a true believer that karma will prevail.

While these sweethearts were being cared for at Animal Acres, they were also receiving a lot of exposure from visitors and volunteers. As it turned out, a couple that volunteered at Animal Acres also happened to be very good friends of the family that adopted TUBBALOVE and OSCAR from me over the past year or so. They loved the piggies. Size was not an issue and the fact that GEORGIE was so fearful did not prevent them from wanting to adopt the pair. They were a bonded pair after all. Who could possibly separate them after all they have been through?

Since the Ranch Manager no longer works at Animal Acres, it became a priority for me to get them placed sooner than later. I was prepared to bring them home and I was committed to keeping them, regardless if it meant no more taking in fosters and no further adoptions. If it meant I could not work rescue any longer, I was committed to these pigs. I owed them that much.

The timing could not have been more perfect, but I received a call from Dawn. She told me they are very good friends of Frank's and they were wondering if even though he is no longer at Animal Acres, would it still be possible to adopt Georgie and Dolly? I literally cried when I got the call. I was overwhelmed with joy. Not only were they an exceptional referral twice over, but they live locally! They had already adopted two cow girls (girl cows) from Animal Acres just months earlier.

Dawn and Eric came to see my set-up, they knew about Animal Acres' set-up and while I could not get to their place for a couple weeks to do their home assessment, they moved forward with constructing an enclosure. They have the run of over 2 acres when their parents are home and the safety of their secure enclosure when night time falls.

Dawn E-mails me with regular updates and welcomes not only my visits when I ask, but also said that Dolly's former owners are welcome to visit anytime as well. Dolly's first mom checks in with me from time to time for updates. Sometimes things just happen as they are supposed to.

Once again, without a fabulous network and everyone's commitment and diligent efforts, this never could have happened. Thank you all for your continued support in the plight of the pigs. They need us!



Placing Pigs That Need Homes in Homes That Need Pigs.



OGGIE - a 3-year old male. He's a bit large and a little grumpy, but in the right environment and with the proper diet, he could very well blossom into a very nice boy.
