Editor's Note: This article is from "Pigs 4Ever" newsletter written by Dottie Eggeman in Florida. Even though the totals below are not our "local" Southern California totals, they still very much reflect the epidemic nationwide regarding pigs that need to be rescued and re-homed. SCAMPP receives many calls and E-Mails each week from shelters and persons who need to re-home their pigs for various reasons. Following are excerpts from the newsletter article from 'Pigs 4Ever"...

Thankfully the calls I get here over the years have gone down, but we still get them even though we don't adopt out or take in pigs. Sadly there are more people wanting to dump a pig then get a pig. Part of what I have always told those wanting to buy a pig from a breeder is to adopt from a rescue/sanctuary as there are literally thousands in need of a good home. Even I didn't realize that the number was close to 8,000, but last fall Gina from the Facebook group MPPEE reached out to numerous pig rescues and sanctuaries. This is what she found: Beginning September of last year, we reached out to numerous Pig Rescue Organizations and Sanctuaries and asked how many pigs they had at their organizations. Out of 179 organizations that were contacted, 141 responded. There is a mix of large breed, small breed and some feral pigs; HOWEVER, the largest majority of homeless, dumped, abandoned or owner surrenders are potbelly pigs, also referred to as mini pigs. We would like to emphasize.. the numbers we've gathered DO NOT EVEN INCLUDE the rescues and sanctuaries whom we did not hear back from, county animal shelters, daily social media owner surrender pleas, Craigslist, livestock groups, pages or ads, breeder piglets that are up for sale, etc. The number of accounted for pigs that are currently in pig rescues and sanctuaries that we have been able to contact is 7,802 pigs and counting. These numbers keep rising as we continue to hear from more and more rescues. Again, that is only numbers from 141 rescues

- and sanctuaries! Here are just a few quotes from some of the rescues we've contacted: \* The Blind Spot Animal Sanctuary "We receive about a dozen pleas a day. We ask every single owner surrender where they got their pigs from. 99% are from breeders. The reasons for surrenders are typically behavior such as single pig syndrome, didn't' meet expectations such as grew too big, etc."
  - Red Oak Animal Rescue "It is an enormous problem. Over breeding and lack of knowledge is causing such prob-\* lems for our rescue community. We get calls daily to take in more. It's heartbreaking.
  - Belly Brothers Pig Rescue "We have over 100 surrender requests we have pending, but only have so much space." Houston Mini Pig Rescue Network "We also get requests to take in owner surrenders at the rate of approxi-\* ⋇ mately 30-40 per week."

  - In Loving Swineness Sanctuary "For every pig we take in, we get contacted about eight more we can't help." Whispering Rise Farm Animal Sanctuary "I'm getting 6-8 requests each week to take pigs." Kindred Spirits Sanctuary "We have been unable to take over 300 pigs we've received calls about since Jan 1st \* of this year."
  - \*
  - Hercule's Haven "We get calls almost daily to take pigs." Sloppy Seconds "We get calls weekly, sometimes daily for pig surrenders." \*
  - Peace Ridge Sanctuary "On average, we get at least 80 calls per year that are pig specific." Winslow Farm Animal Sanctuary "We get 10 to 13 calls per month to take a pig in." \*
  - \*

  - Unity Farm Sanctuary "We get messages almost every week to ask for help with pigs." Hog Haven Rescue Farm PA "I get 3-5 surrenders a day. Just got a phone call and 23 more surrenders." \*
  - \*
  - Out to Pasture Sanctuary "We get requests to re-home more every week or two." Blackbird Ranch Wildlife Rehabilitation "We get calls daily to adopt pigs, but we are sadly at capacity."

The majority of people who get pet pigs have not done their research and find themselves having to re-home their pig because of the following:

- 1. They are not zoned to have a pig as a pet.
- 2. The breeder lied about the true size that the pig will get.
- They found out after the fact that pigs and dogs are not always a good mix.
- 4. They don't have enough time for the pig.
- 5. They don't have sufficient space or housing to properly accommodate a pig.
- 6. Too much work.
- 7. Not what they expected.
- 8. The pig was destructive.
- 9. The pig had aggression issues.
- 10.Potbelly pigs have a life expectancy of 15-20 years and the owners were not willing to make that kind of commitment. and the list goes on.

It is hard to write anything about the Corona Virus because really no one gives you good information and things change. In the beginning, in China, they were trying to blame it as an animal virus that mutated, but I think that more people now feel that it was created in a lab and somehow got out.

Most animals including pigs, dogs, cats, among others, have Corona Viruses that affect them. People have Corona Viruses that cause some of our common diseases. But the 19 virus that we see now did not come from any of those and we can not get the disease Corona Virus of pig, dog, or cat causes.

It does not seem that pigs and other animals

get the Chinese Corona Virus, but I am not aware of studies to prove that or to show if animals can transitionally carry the virus and transmit it around. It does not seem the case with most Corona Viruses, but only time and research will let us know.

In the mean time, I think that people should worry more about themselves and other humans, and follow the prevention measures that the health authorities recommend. By people staying safe, most likely it should keep their pets safe, and we should all get through it. ~ by Dr. Ron T. Vered, DVM

Dear SCAMPP'ers,

Hi, my name is Peggy Wimberly. I have been a member of SCAMPP for almost 30 years, since 1991 shortly after SCAMPP was formed. Currently and for nearly my entire time with SCAMPP, I have been a Board Member, Secretary, Treasurer, Newsletter Editor, Main PR person, Event Coordinator, Webmaster, and in charge of the SCAMPP Booths at our events and bringing all the booth paraphernalia to our events.

### ANNOUNCEMENT!

I am writing to announce that after almost 30 years, I will be resigning my duties at SCAMPP soon (well, sometime before the end of the year). This is a sad, and not easy, decision for me, but necessary due to the fact that my husband and I will be moving out of California within the next few months. I will no longer be "Southern California" and therefore



unable to continue all of the duties I currently perform. I began doing the SCAMPP newsletter over 20 years ago, in the late-1990's, but this might be the last newsletter I create and publish, so forgive me if this article is a bit long and involved (if you know me, you know I am a very detail-oriented person ©). I am not sure who will take over yet.

### HERE'S A LITTLE HISTORY (MINE AND SCAMPP'S)!

I found SCAMPP in 1991 shortly after I got my first potbellied pig, KoKo. He was shipped to me from Missouri and was only 8 weeks old. I did not know about SCAMPP at that time. Back in the mid-1980's when the first Vietnamese Potbellied Pigs were brought to the USA from Canada, you could not even BUY a potbellied pig for under \$5,000. By the early 1990's, I think the prices came down to around \$3,500. I had attempted to get one from a local friend who was raising them, but it didn't work out for various reasons. I soon learned about a breeder in Missouri who was also raising them and from whom I was able to obtain my first potbellied pig KoKo; he was the runt of a litter, already neutered, vaccinated and included the cost of shipping (via Delta Airlines from Missouri to Ontario, CA) for a very good price. Just a couple of months later, I found SCAMPP by seeing them and their pigs at the Los Angeles County Fair's Pet Expo in 1991. I joined SCAMPP and became involved immediately and have never turned back.

In the beginning, SCAMPP used to participate in sanctioned competitive divisional potbellied pig shows (much like competitive horse, dog and cat shows) and was an affiliate division of The National Committee on Potbellied Pigs (NCOPP). Our organization got its name "Southern California Association for Miniature Potbellied Pigs" because we were the Southern California Division of NCOPP. NCOPP dissolved many years ago, but SCAMPP survived with the help of a few dedicated members and I'm proud to say I was one of them. Only a handful of the original charter members of SCAMPP are still to be found today, but they have not been active in SCAMPP for a few years. We've had hundreds of members over the years and many have come and gone for various reasons. SCAMPP has not participated in "competitive shows" since the early 2000's due to the overabundance of potbellied pigs that had been (and still are) bred irresponsibly and causing shelters, foster homes and sanctuaries to be overloaded with pigs that have sadly been unwanted, abused and neglected. SCAMPP then began to focus on educational outreach and rescue/adoption aspects of these precious potbellied pigs. My main interest in SCAMPP has always been about educating the public regarding the myth of "teacup" pigs and about the proper needs & care of potbellied pigs. I have always promoted SCAMPP wherever I go and try to get as many new members as possible, as well as promote adoptions of potbellied pigs. It's always been my desire to see more members & people get involved in SCAMPP to help with these efforts. I have also always been very member-orientated, caring much about the members and member-relations.

KoKo passed away in 2004 at 12 years of age. I rescued a baby girl pig in 2001; I named her Dora because she was (and always was) "a-DORA-able" <sup>(IIII)</sup>. She passed away in Dec. 2018 at 17 years of age. I also rescued a 10-year-old male pig, named Wilbur, from a shelter in 2004; he passed away in Jan. 2018 at around 24 years of age. So since 2018 (after having potbellied pigs almost 28 years), I have been pig-less but have stayed involved in SCAMPP because I care about its mission and the many members I have come to know, including those only through correspondence. ~ continued on next page ~


